Every month we throw the spotlight on the people who work hard behind the scenes on the APODC management committee.

Name: Frian Wadia Role: Committee Member

Hi my name is Frian Wadia. My hubby Burzin and myself have three lovely boys, Khushru, Kayan and Zeus aged 10, 8.5 and 7 years respectively. I am an early childhood teacher and currently work part-time besides caring for my very demanding brood of boys and our lively home in Auckland. I love gardening, listening to music and watching movies when I get the chance.

My oldest son Khushru has a genetic disorder, DOORS syndrome, profound deafness (has bilateral CI's) and autism; and my second son Kayan has a global developmental delay and auditory neuropathy. The beginning of our journey in the world of disability, health and education has been quite daunting, lonely and challenging, and probably will continue to be so from time to time in the future as well.

However, it has also been a journey filled with hopes and dreams, learning and growing, joys and celebrations that have given me a new richer perspective on life. Every little achievement is cherished and diversity is appreciated and valued very much. Most of all I have come to value people and the different relationships that tend to contribute so significantly into our lives. I look forward to meeting you at our family events, and sharing with you a bit about our journey towards making a more meaningful, richer and fuller life for our children and our family.

Name:Chris ShieldsRole:Administrator and Committee Secretary

Hi, my name is Chris and I got involved with APODC eight years ago when my then three year-old son Nick was diagnosed with a mild hearing impairment. He and his older sister Penny were screened from birth (it wasn't mandatory then) because of my husband's genetic deafness, which can be traced back through five generations in his family. Penny and Nick were both born with full hearing and we thought we had outsmarted the genes until Nick's diagnosis. My husband, Graham, has progressed to moderately deaf, as the condition is degenerative. His oldest son Jamie, 21, also has a mild impairment. Father and sons wear hearing aids and all three expect their hearing to get worse until the loss is severe in their older years. As a child Graham remembers talking into his grandmother's bosom, because her hearing aid was pinned to her chest!

Nick took to hearing aids well as a pre-schooler. Dad always wore them so it was pretty normal at home. He's now at Intermediate and uses an FM system, which he started at primary school. This has been a great help in the classroom. Like Graham he's developed lip reading skills and uses visual cues. We speak English at home and recently started NZSL family classes. I dragged the deaf members of the family kicking and screaming to learn NZSL. "What do we need that for? We've got technology!" As the mother/wife and ears of the house, I insisted. There's only so much frustration I could handle: What did he/she/you say? Louder, I haven't got my ears on. Stop shouting, my hearing aids are on! Huh? Wha'? You didn't tell me that! And so on. Apart from getting our L-plates with this beautiful language, my blood pressure is getting back to normal.

In the early days it was a relief to meet other families with deaf children at APODC events. Nick had never seen another child with hearing aids until then. I've learned a lot from other families. We are also lucky to have support and guidance from some inspirational adults from the Deaf community. They were once deaf children themselves and can give us useful insights.

I've recently been contracted to provide administration for APODC, which I do from home. I'm the person on the end of the email and phone when you have questions or want to put your name down for events. I also help out on the committee as the secretary and with running events. It's great to see our membership growing and people joining APODC while their children are young. In my opinion that is the hardest adjustment time. Drawing on the knowledge and experience of others in the first few years really helped ease my worries about the way ahead.
