

Location: 577 Great South Road, Papatoetoe, Auckland 2104


We will have the entire venue to ourselves for you and your family to enjoy. APODC will provide lunch so that we can all come together to meet and mingle.

Can Bears Ski?

Written by Raymond Antrobus Dunabar **Illustrated by Polly**

Raymond Antrobus is a deaf poet and teacher. He has won the Ted Hughes Award and became the first poet to be awarded the Rathbones Folio Prize. About *Can Bears Ski*, he says, "It's the book I could see myself reaching for as a child, and I can't wait to have it exist in the world."

Polly Dunbar is a partially deaf author-illustrator who has created several books for young children.

About the Book

Is Little Bear ignoring his friends when they say hi, or is something else going on? A discovery opens new doors in a tale that will delight kids with deafness and all children learning to navigate their world.

Little Bear *feels* the world around him. He feels his bed rumble when Dad Bear wakes him up in the morning. He feels the floor shake when his teacher stomps to get his attention. But something else is missing, like when his friends tell jokes that he isn't sure he understands, or when all around him Little Bear hears the question,

"Can bears ski?" Then, one day, Dad Bear takes him to see an "aud-i-olo-gist," and Little Bear learns that he has been experiencing deafness and will start wearing hearing aids. Soon he figures out what that puzzling refrain is: "Can you hear me?" Little Bear's new world is LOUD and will take some getting used to, but with the love and support of Dad Bear, he will find his way. In this lyrical picture book, award-winning creators Raymond Antrobus and Polly Dunbar draw on their own experiences to tell Bear's story.

Deaf Flag



On the 9 July 2023 the World Federation of the Deaf voted on the official flag for Deaf people and Sign language community. The flag was designed by French deafblind artist Arnaud Balard.

Behind the meaning of the Official Deaf Flag

Meaning of the hands:

The image represents two hands, one in yellow and the other in turquoise, these are vibrant hands that sign. Showing the diversity of speakers of sign languages and of sign language speakers in the world: deaf, deafblind, codas, hearing. Open hand means hope and brotherhood. Radiant hands means influence and affirmation.

Significations of the colours:

TURQUOISE BLUE: represents the deaf community and Sign Language, pride and unity


represents the color of light, enlightened spirit, life and "living together".

DARK BLUE: represents the earth, humanity and living together on the planet. It is also the color of the WFD and it is also the color of the ribbon of the concept of deafhood thus of the deaf culture, the enlightenment and freedom. Living together - awareness of societies for societies for the equality between sign languages and vocal languages.
